CLAREMONT COLLEGE ART EXHIBITION






OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP

EXAM INFORMATION

Students and teachers are busy finalising assessments and preparing for the examination period. Students who are sitting an exam should now be studying for it.

Some subjects with externally assessed folios have already been submitted, but others are due soon. All students who study these subjects should be making final submissions now. All students must bring their NOTICE OF ENROLMENT ('pink slip') to every exam. It is the entry ticket.

TASC MEDICAL CERTIFICATE

If a student is sick and cannot attend the exam, a medical practitioner will need to complete the TASC Medical Certificate (either as a fillable PDF or using the printed copy in the Student Exam Guide) and submit it to TASC on the student's behalf. Read more about the process for illness and emergency during exams by scanning the QR code.



STUDENTS WITH REASONABLE ADJUSTMENTS

Students who applied for reasonable adjustments, and had them granted by TASC, will have those adjustments made for their examinations. Adjustments may include additional time, separate rooms and ICT facilities if awarded by TASC. **Students should carefully read the instructions contained in the email from TASC for specific instructions.**

Importantly, **additional time is given BEFORE the exam**. Students must arrive at college the equivalent of the additional time plus 15 minutes before their exam is due to begin. For example, a student with an exam at 9.00am with a 30 minute additional time allocation, should arrive at college around 8.00am on the day of the exam.

EXAM TIPS:

- 1. **Be early** your exam will be setting up before the time it starts. Students with reasonable adjustments that include extra time, are allocated extra time before their exam.
- 2. Bring your Notice of Enrolment to every exam it is your entry ticket to gain access to the room.
- 3. The **first 15 minutes of the exam are for reading** through the exam paper and planning your examination responses. You must not start recording your answers during this time.
- 4. Your **TASC ID** is to be used on exams **NOT your NAME**. Never write your name in an exam paper.
- 5. **Strict rules apply** and are monitored by TASC representatives who supervise the exams. Exams are NOT run by Claremont College.


Plan small rewards for yourself to keep you motivated while studying for example: when I have memorised these formulae, I will open the chocolates!

Don't try to do too much too late; the key to effective revision is shorter, regular bursts of planned study that gradually build up to the examination date.

HORTICULTURE: CONNECTING COMMUNITY AT CLAREMONT COLLEGE 2025 -



2025 saw the return of Horticulture as a course at Claremont College. We were excited to provide two versions of horticulture for students to engage in their understanding of plants, gardening and the horticultural industry.

For VET learners we delivered Certificate II in Horticulture AHC20422 with an industry focus and hands-on experiences associated with growing, production and maintenance of plants both on site at Claremont College and with the generous support of the Material Institute (Botanical) site in Bridgewater for industry work. For our higher and additional needs students, we ran Horticultural Therapy which involved learning about sciences and technology to work in gardens, build and make products and structures, and be a part of an inclusive and creative space. Both classes supported the development of the plant nursery and the creation and running of The Plant Shop and participated in a wide variety of excursions to explore the wide field of horticulture in our area.

Students worked around the Claremont

College campus to improve the grounds for students and staff by creating pots of plants, looking after the Aboriginal Harmony Garden and managing

the orchard, vegetable gardens and flower gardens. We conducted pruning operations for small tree health, site safety and aesthetic appeal. We planted a hedge, started our Koala food plantation and grew vegetable seedlings for the Mission Australia local garden as well as the day-to-day management and running behind the scenes for The Plant Shop and its nursery. In addition, we ran a plant library which supported staff to borrow plants by the term to improve their work and classrooms spaces.

In 2026 we look forward to continuing with both classes and furthering our partnerships with Bonorong Wildlife

Sanctuary, Hobart Aquarium and Zoo, the Material Institute and Mission Australia to create meaningful learning experiences and engagement with local community and industry in horticulture. We aspire to give our students real and valued experiences and pathways into their futures.









The horticultural classes operated a thriving enterprise in The Plant Shop and were lucky enough to receive donations of plants and products from several community members and businesses. All proceeds were used by the horticulture classes to buy potting media, plants and tools to support their further learning and development of the plant nursery and The Plant Shop.







Organisations who we would like to thank in particular include: Plantz Indoorz, Tibball's Nursery, Stoneman's Garden Centre, The Material Institute (Botanical) at Bridgewater, Mission Australia and special thanks to the staff and students from other areas of Claremont College who in some way supported the success of the horticulture program in 2025 including: Art classes, Cooking classes, Hospitality class, Automotive class, Animal Care class, and the exceptional support from Design and Production and Construction classes. The success of horticulture at Claremont College this year, and hopefully moving forward, is a true reflection of the community spirit and combined success of Claremont College and its wider community.

The competition will now be judged by industry professionals and the winners will be announced soon. Regardless of the results, we are very proud of the work the students produced.






